Workshop Outline

This workshop focuses on the investigation of inclusive potentials and deficits of sustainable and inclusive local and regional recreation / tourism in the northern part of the GREATER MUNICH AREA – searching a model for the future development.

Why is this case interesting?

The area of Munich is of topical interest for the following reasons:

Urban growth

Munich belongs to the 10 most important European Metropolitan Regions. With around 7% the population growth is nowhere else as high in Germany; the current number of population for the whole region is around 5,5 Mio. The increase of landscape consumption due to settlement and traffic is accordingly above average and has been in the recent years by about 4%. The population of the City of Munich, currently about 1.5 Mio., is expected to grow by about 230,000 inhabitants until 2030. Population growth and urban development will increase pressure on urban green spaces and regional recreation and natural areas. On the other hand it promotes the development of a connected green structure for recreation.

Two worlds of recreation and tourism - Postcard Landscape versus GNP Bavarian Landscape

Outside the city of Munich the surrounding landscape can be sorted out in two main types with very different qualities and value:

In the south of Munich we have a high quality landscape by topography, vegetation, wildlife, biodiversity, land use and aesthetics and low impacts of mankind ("Postcard Bavarian Landscape"). In the northern fringe of Munich we have a landscape which has simple qualities in topography and aesthetics and a huge impact of mankind which raises big losses in vegetation, wildlife, biodiversity and spiritual home -we call it "GNP Bavarian Landscape". In this GNP (Gross National Product) Bavarian Landscape economic revenues score higher than natural resources, biodiversity and spiritual home - this is the region where money is made while in the so-called Postcard Bavarian Landscape it is spent. The GNP Bavarian Landscape is less attractive, has big deficits in potentials and has a huge increase of population. Altogether quality of life and attractiveness for recreation and tourism are lower than in the Postcard Bavarian landscapes - resulting in big challenges for landscape architects and planners.

Inclusive local and regional recreation and tourism

The challenge for an attractive Greater Munich Area is to improve the qualities of recreation and tourism as a basis for a sustainable spatial development. Each inhabitant should have the possibility to find attractive landscapes, "nearby nature" and recreational facilities within walking or biking distance from home.

At the moment the touristic attractiveness is low but the potentials are high due to a large amount of visitors and tourists related to the Munich International Airport, business and industrial areas as well as scientific and research facilities.

For all target groups – inhabitants, visitors, refugees - besides the question of components and elements the question of identity and spiritual home is getting more and more important. This question aims at the existing settlements and surrounding landscapes.

Hotspots of tourism and recreation in the GNP landscape

The area is characterised by a wide range of relevant elements. The main elements are:

- Schleissheim Castle (touristic, history 17th century)
- Dachau Concentration camp (touristic, history 2nd worldwar)
- Allianz Arena (touristic, architectural, 21th century)
- rubbish mountain (sports and recreation, 20th century)
- heathland areas (recreation, landuse, biodiversity)
- riparian corridors of Amper and Isar (biodiversity, recreation)
- Airport Franz Josef Strauss (touristic and technical highlight)
- Freising Domberg und Weihenstephan (touristic)
- water – canals, rivers, gravel ponds, rowing regatta course (recreation)
- recreation farming (horse farms, sheep, fallow deers, etc.)
- cultural landscapes (agricultural and forestal areas as basis for recreation activities like cycling, hiking, walking, riding)

Aspects and questions this workshop is going to address

The workshop is focused on the northern area of GREATER MUNICH the so called GNP Landscape. Based on the analysis which has to be done on different levels and sources the participants should work towards visions, principles and recommendations developed for local and regional recreation and tourism but also creating new approaches for inclusive concepts. Therefore, the following questions are addressed:

- What are the components / elements of local and regional recreation / tourism in the GNP Munich Landscape?
- What are the deficits /weaknesses of local and regional recreation?
- What are the factors to be addressed for a successful inclusive development of local and regional recreation/tourism?
- Which strategic and spatial models can be suggested for the successful development of an inclusive local and regional recreation / tourism in the GNP landscape?

Since 2103 he continues teaching at HSWT in the International Master of Landscape Architecture (IMLA). His main focus and also subjects of research are cross community development, landuse planning, village renewal and public participation in metropolitan areas.


